



Make a Fold Over Tassel


Fold a measuring tape through the ring on your bag and determine how far down the bag you would like the tassel to fall. Cut a piece of seat belt webbing to the desired length.




Fold the webbing in half lengthwise to find the center and mark with a pin. Measure and mark 3/4" on each side of the pin.



With sharp scissors, trim the very edge of all long sides, starting at the unfinished end and ending at the marks drawn in the previous step. In other words, leave the edges between the lines intact.



Carefully, so it does not yet start to fray, fold the long edges between the marks in to meet at the center. Stitch between the marks on each long edge (see the dashed lines).



Thread the webbing through the bag's ring so equal amounts hang on each side. Stitch across, close to the ring to secure. Insert both ends of the webbing through one d-ring and slide to the top. Repeat to add all d-rings. On the back side, hand stitch the rings to the webbing to secure.

At each edge, pull the vertical fibers to the sides to expose the horizontal fibers. Pull the horizontal fibers out and discard. Continue until all the fibers are loose.

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
